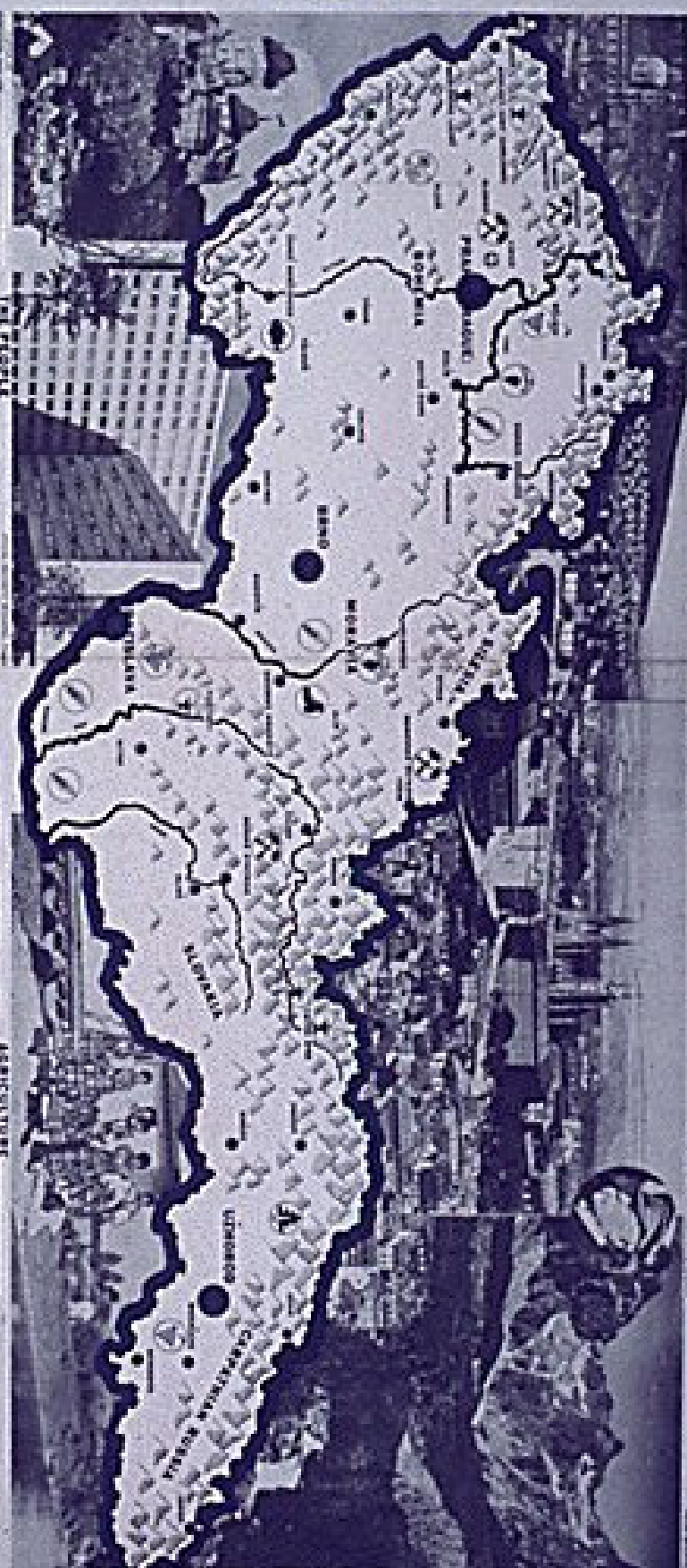
CULTURE

# CHILD-LABOR STANDARDS FOR THE NATION'S CHILDREN

No Child Under 16 Years of Age  
Should Leave School for Gainful Employment



A basic 16-year minimum age, applying to industrial work at any time and to agricultural work during periods of required school attendance, is the standard set by the child-labor provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act, administered by the Children's Bureau, which apply to producers of goods for shipment in interstate commerce.

Children working for their parents in agriculture or other occupations except manufacturing and mining are exempt from these provisions.

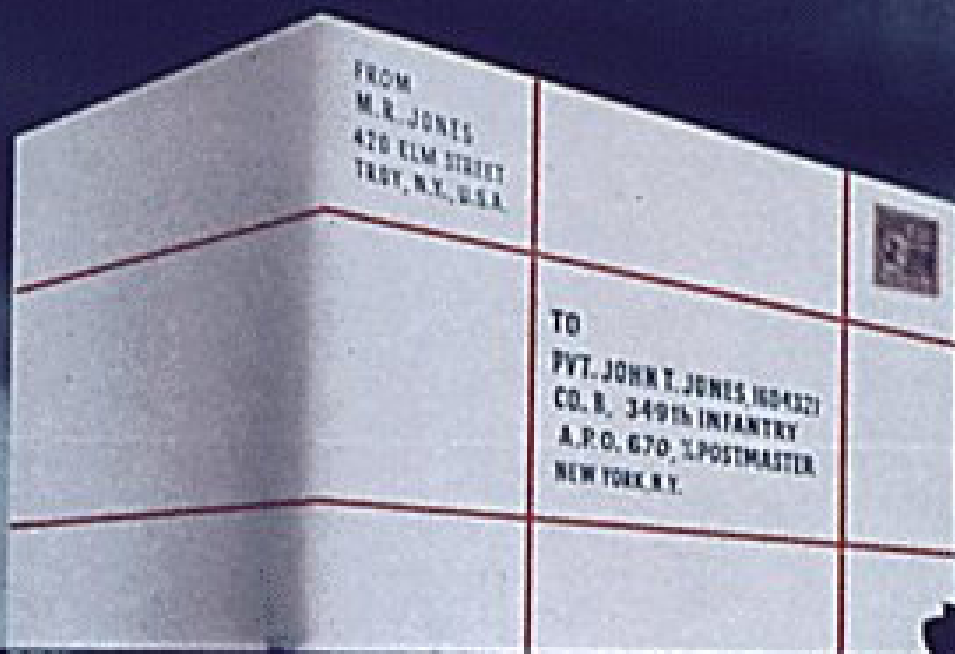


1. Christmas packages for men overseas will be accepted from September 15th to October 15th without the usual request.
2. Packages must weigh no more than five pounds—must not exceed fifteen inches in length or thirty-six inches in length and girth combined.
3. Wrap securely, address correctly—include rank and full name, serial number, name of outfit, A. P. O. number, postmaster at the port of embarkation.

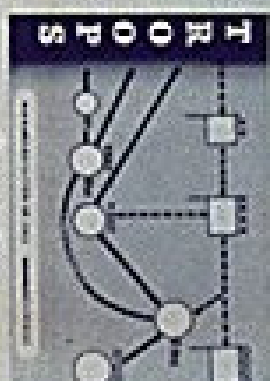

# Clean Weapons Shoot Straight



## Get this Straight too . . .

Daily care of SMALL ARMS is the IMPORTANT THING!

### Clean and Oil Regularly . . .

Always clean your rifle and/or other weapons after shooting. Never let a weapon stand out in dirt. Clean and oil as soon as possible. (Don't forget the clips and magazines.)

### Handle and Ship Carefully . . .

Don't drop, bang, or throw weapons. Never touch or try unscrewed sights or adjustments. Never swing or discharge until completely clean. Preserve. Light. Store in a dry place. When shipped, pack weapons individually in crates. Never store together.

# Clean WOOD FLOORS Right

- 1 Daily care should be dry sweeping or mopping.
- 2 Scrub with soap and water no oftener than absolutely necessary. Frequent soaking softens wood—makes it splinter and wear away.
- 3 Use only Mild soap for scrubbing or mopping.
- 4 Clean a small area at a time. Rinse off soap with clear water, and wipe dry immediately.
- 5 Never flood the floor or let water stand on it.

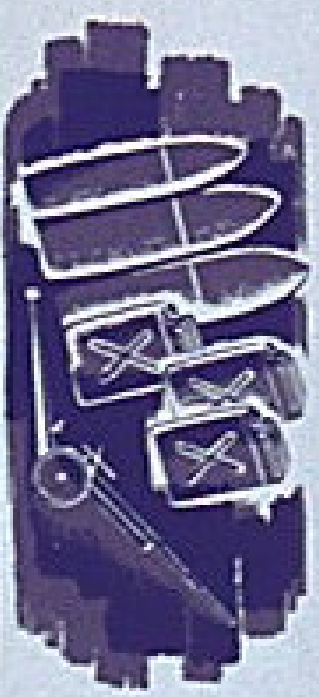

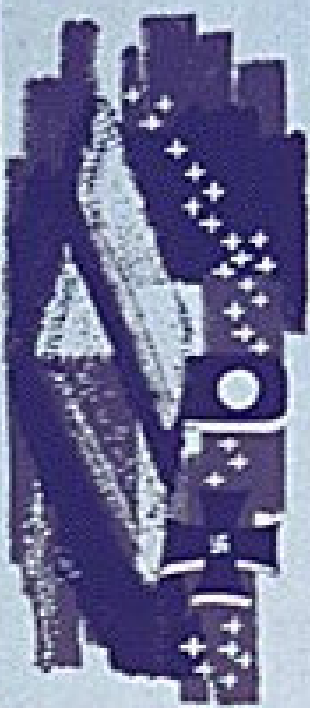

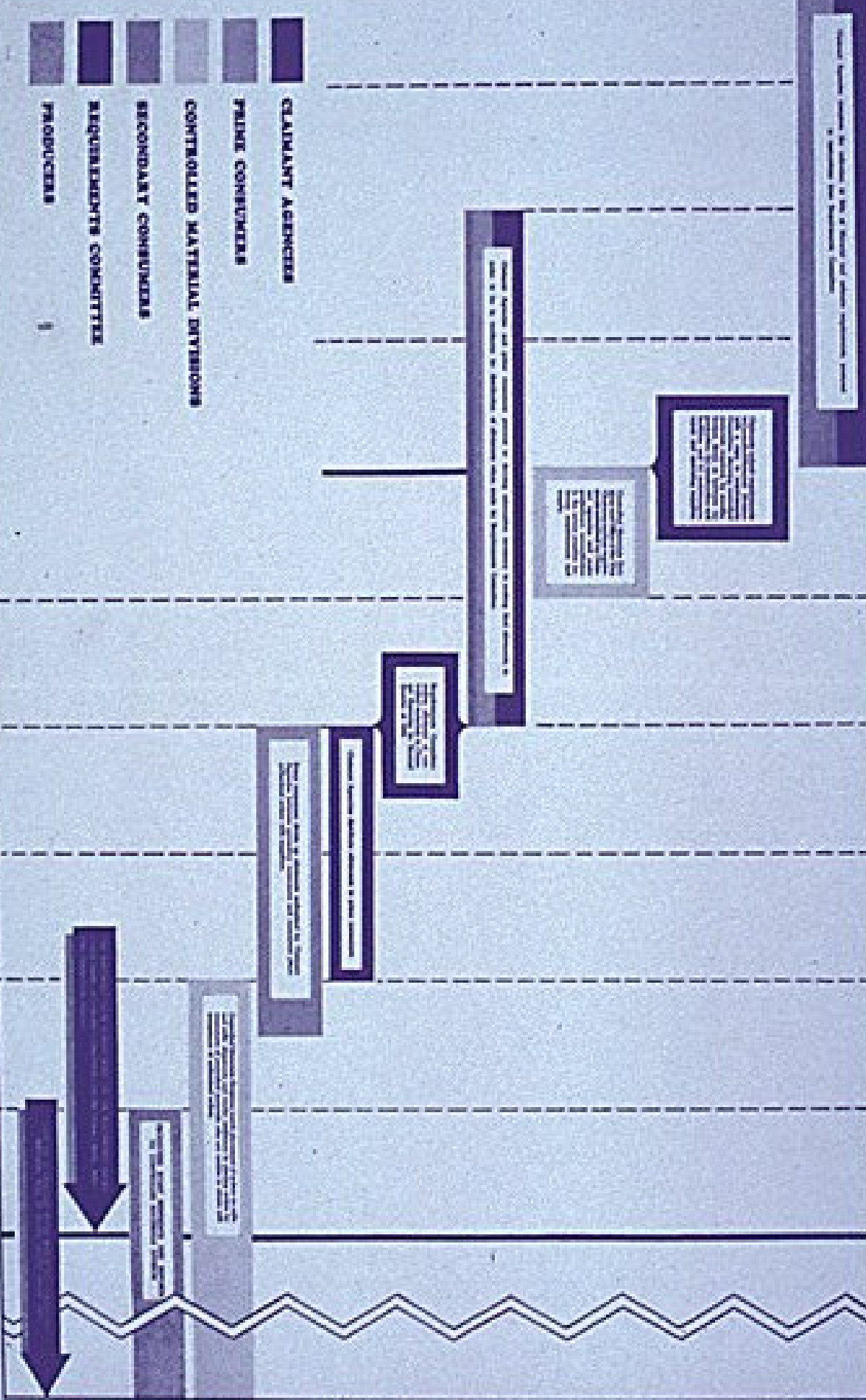

# COLD FACTS



**SAVE**

You can win against winter if you pay attention to the special cold-weather operating instructions for vehicles, TB ORD 126, Cold Weather Lubrication and Service of Combat and Transport Materiel, 19 July 1944.

Consult War Department Supply Bulletin SB 9-16, 2 March 1944, for authorized winterization equipment for automotive materiel.

Requisition winter grade lubricants early and use them strictly in accordance with your War Department Lubrication Order.

Keep your storage battery fully charged and maintained according to instructions in TB ORD 67, Storage Batteries, 18 March 1944.

Perform regular and special preventive maintenance services according to instructions in the technical manual for your equipment.

To keep radiator filled, never add straight water. Add temperature-tested mixture of compound, antifreeze, and water. Leave room for expansion so coolant won't overflow and be wasted. Play safe—make sure your vehicle has antifreeze protection—test it yourself—test it frequently!
