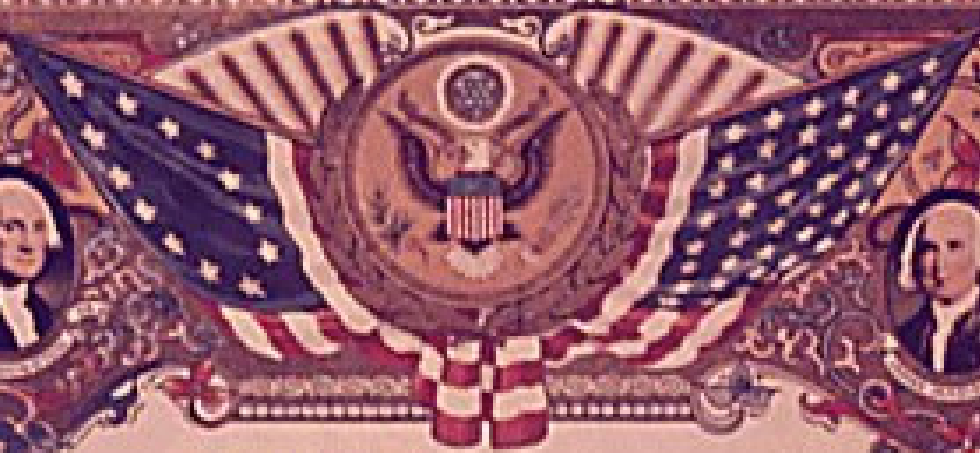

150th Anniversary of the Constitution

By the President of The United States of America

A Proclamation

WHILE the Constitution of the United States was signed on September 17, 1787, and led by June 21, 1788, been ratified by the necessary number of States and

WHILE George Washington was inaugurated as the first President of the United States on April 30, 1789,

Now, therefore, **FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT**, President of the United States of America, hereby designate the period from September 17, 1937, to April 30, 1939, as one of commemoration of the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the signing and the ratification of the Constitution and of the inauguration of the first President under that Constitution.

In commemorating this period we shall affirm our faith in those who conceived and established the Constitution "in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquillity, provide for the common defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity."

We shall recognize that the Constitution is an enduring instrument fit for the governing of a far-flung population of more than one hundred and thirty million engaged in diverse and varied pursuits, even as it was fit for the governing of a small agrarian nation of less than four million.

It is therefore appropriate that in the period herein set apart we shall think afresh of the founding of our Government under the Constitution, how it has served us in the past and how in the days to come its principles will guide the nation ever forward.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States of America to be affixed.

DONE at the City of Washington this fourth day of July, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and thirty seven, and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and sixty second.

2 Use block or modified stacking for items which are uniform in size, weight, and content. Arrange supplies for easy receipt and issue.



3 Supply installations are vulnerable to air attack. To reduce possibility of complete loss do not stock all of one item in one place.



4 Protect supplies with paulins, tentage, or any covering available. Tie covering securely. Allow adequate air circulation above, below, and between stacks.



5 Supply dumps are prime targets. Structures used with nets and natural foliage will both camouflage and protect supplies.



6 The "first in, first out" principle protects supplies. Check constantly for freezing, mildew, rot, rust, and rodents.

Manpower Commission Chairman Paul V. McNutt and Petroleum Administrator for War Harold L. Ikin, in February 9, 1943, in a joint public statement said:

"Reports are being received in Washington from a few places to the effect that oil company employees misunderstood the War Manpower Commission's recent statement about non-defensible occupations.

"The reports are that oil, natural gas and gasoline company employees engaged in vital and essential jobs in that industry failed to report for work and instead were seeking employment in munitions plants or some other kind of work which they thought was listed as more essential by the War Manpower Commission.

"Petroleum is regarded as one of the most essential of war industries and has been so designated previously by the War Manpower Com-

mission. Bulletins issued by the WMC to local United States Employment Service Offices, and Selective Service Occupational Bulletin Nos. 15 and 21, issued in August and September, 1942, for the guidance of local draft boards and of employers, list 179 specific classes of jobs in the petroleum and natural gas industry and its transportation service which are directly classed as essential activities.

"Oil and natural gas are vital to this war and it does not help to win the war for men who have long been trained and skilled in this industry to leave their present jobs. We wish to emphasize that while planes, tanks, and ships fight the battles, they cannot fight without oil to fuel them. The production, refining, transportation, and distribution of oil and gas are all necessary."

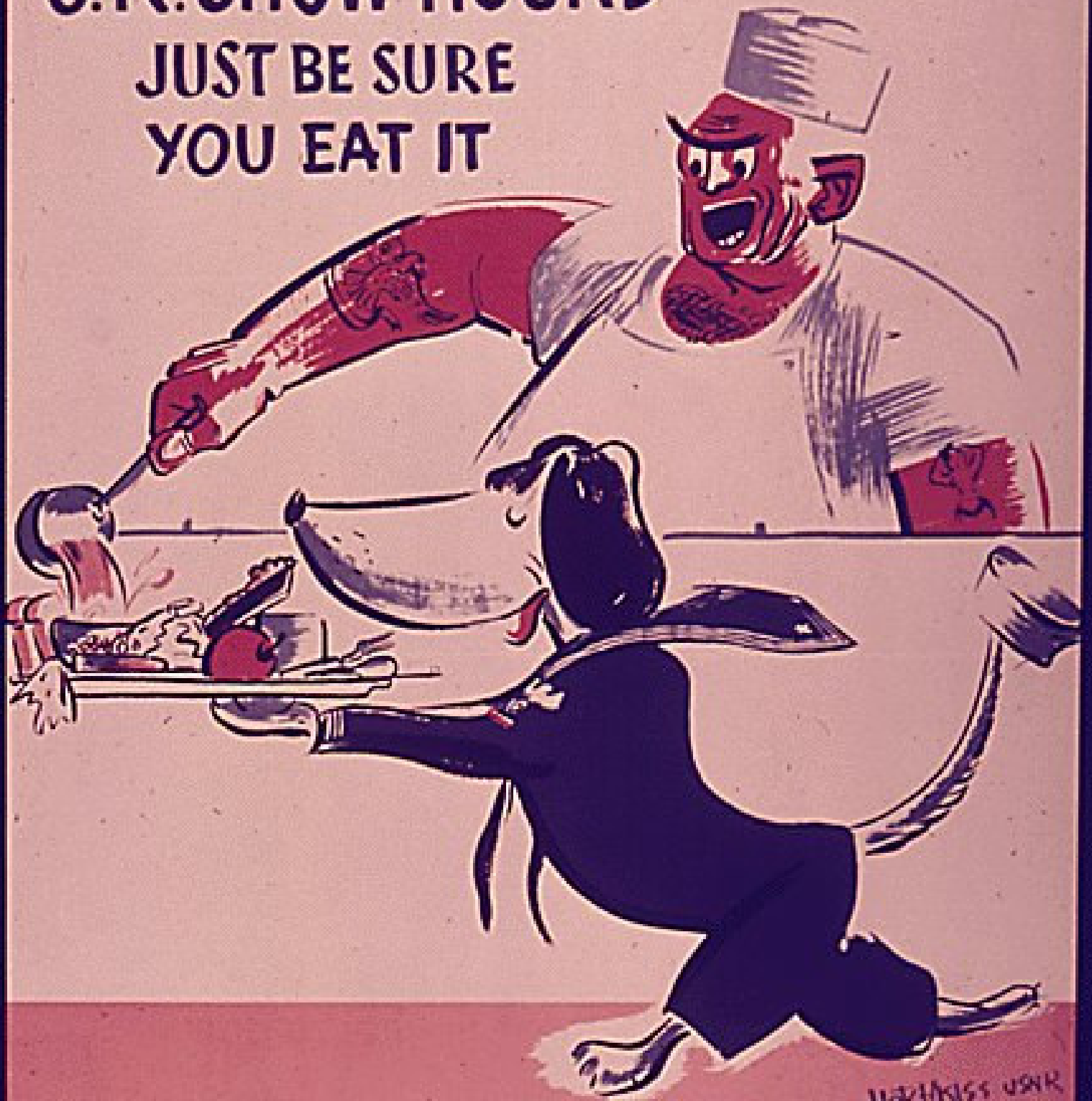

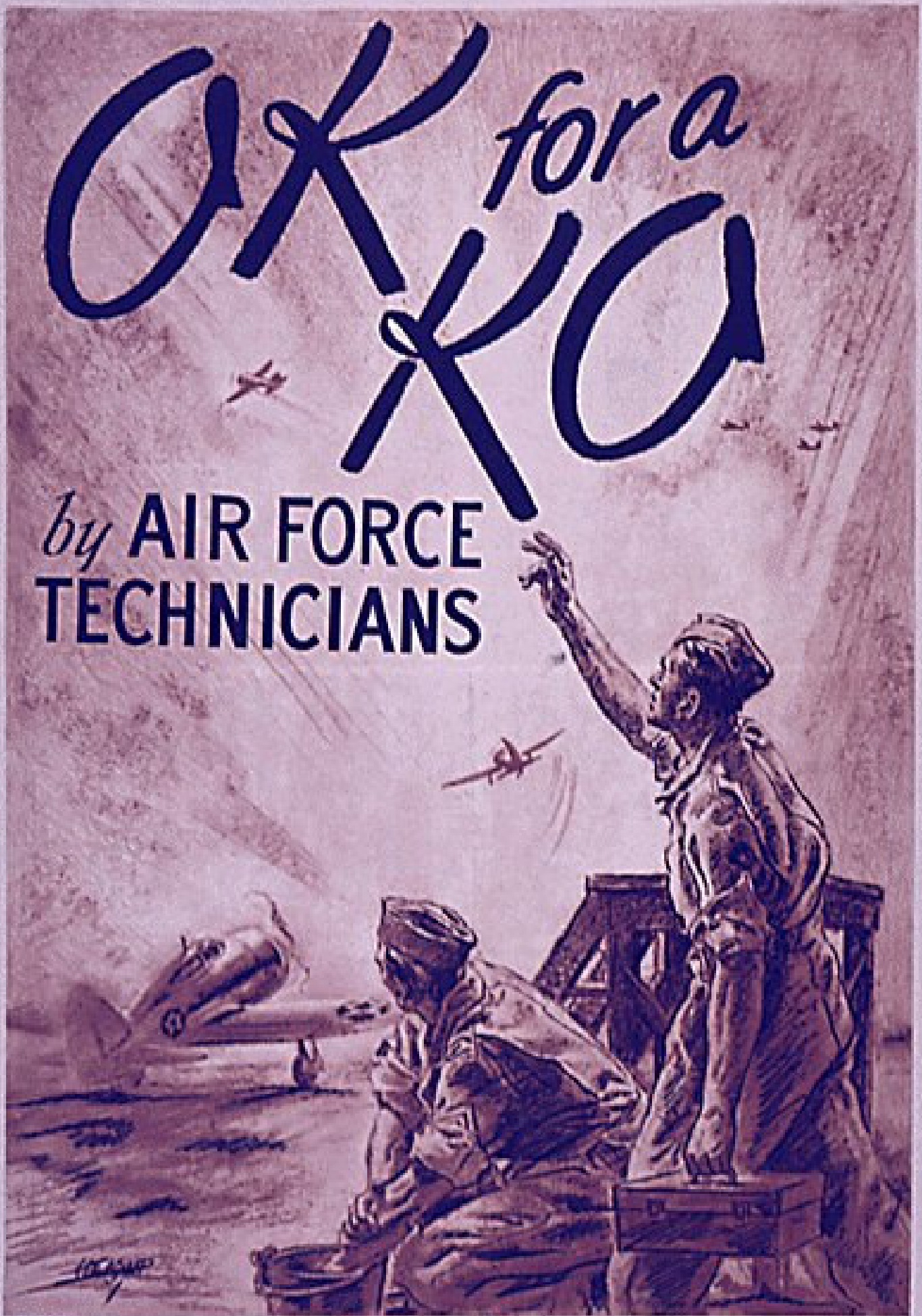

(1) **INSTALL BATTERY.** Select battery and test each cell (sub-par. b (1) above). Use battery lifter strap at terminals and position battery in hanger. Positive (+) terminal of battery must be toward front of vehicle on long wheelbase models or toward outside on short wheelbase.

(2) **ATTACH** surface of battery posts and cable terminals to positive battery terminals; use ground strap (able to positive (+)). Tighten ground strap to prevent corrosion.

(3) **INSURE** battery is properly secured over hanger studs.

e. If battery is not satisfactory, tests should be made.

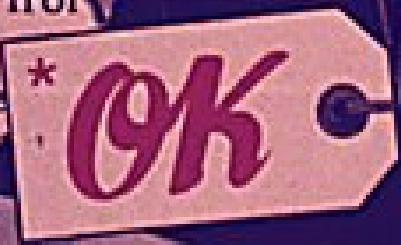
(4) **REMOVE** battery cover outward to remove terminals from battery. Remove bolt nuts. Remove battery from hanger. Remove two ground straps (one on long wheelbase), or (GM-5275713-1).

(5) **CLEAN** battery terminals in solution. Clean terminals by scraping. Clean terminals on frame side rail. Be sure all bolting surfaces are clean and that nuts are tight. Position ground strap on battery terminals.

(6) **BOLT** battery to frame, using two bolts with flat washers on outside and lock washers and nuts at inside of frame side rail. Be sure all bolting surfaces are clean and that nuts are tight. **SAVE** battery in hanger. Clean terminals of battery. Position ground strap
